DISASTER PREPAREDNESS:

Why teach Disaster Preparedness at School?

Children depend on daily routines. They wake up, eat breakfast, go to school, play with friends. When emergencies or disasters interrupt this routine, many children may become anxious. In a disaster, they'll look to you and other adults for help. How you react to an emergency gives them clues on how to act. If you react with alarm, your child may become more scared. They see your fear as proof that the danger is real. By teaching and preparing an emergency plan as well as a preparedness kit with your students, they will bring the skills learned home where they can assist their families in becoming more prepared for such emergencies.

FIREFIGHTERS ARE YOUR FRIENDS

A firefighter is a community helper who protects people from fire and keeps them safe. Firefighters work for the fire department and can help us in many ways. Firefighters wear special clothes and equipment to keep them safe. Some children are scared by the look and sounds of firefighter equipment. Explaining how the equipment helps a firefighter stay safe while working is important. Becoming familiar with the role of the firefighter and the sight and sound of the equipment can lessen a child's potential fear during a fire and encourage cooperation during life-saving fire rescue incidents.

- 2. Explain how a uniform helps a community helper stay safe.**
- 3. Acknowledge that children do not need to fear firefighters, even when they are wearing gear**
